A Memorial Service and Wreath Laying Ceremony takes place at the Lincoln Tomb at 10:00 am, the exact time of Mary's funeral in 1882. Several organizations present wreaths including the Association of Lincoln Presenters, Lincoln's Tent 48, Mary Todd Lincoln House, Illinois State DUVCW, Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Mary Lincoln's Coterie.

Following the service, members gathered at Maldaner's Restaurant for a buffet luncheon. This year's key note speaker was Steve Ingram who discussed the process of photography during the Civil War era.

In May of 2016, Steve and Sharon Woods took part in the filming of a dramatization of "The Baltimore Plot", an episode of The Folklorist, an award winning series by NewTV, Newton, Massachusetts. Steve and Sharon travelled from their New Hampshire home to Dedham, Massachusetts where Steve was filmed in the Endicott Mansion for scenes showing Alan Pinkerton convincing Lincoln not to continue on his planned travel through Baltimore because of a credible plot to assassinate him.

The next week, both Sharon and Steve were filmed on Cape Cod at the Chatham Railroad Museum. The scene began with Lincoln giving his farewell speech in Springfield from the back of an antique train car. Sharon stood as Mary Lincoln among other "extras" in the crowd watching that speech.

Later Steve as Lincoln was spirited off the opposite side of the train with the help of a fog machine that added mystery to the scene.

Steve was impressed with the historical research the producers done to make the production as accurate as possible, and says that he "recognized Alan Pinkerton" as soon as he saw him backstage! Although Mary Lincoln did not have a prominent role in this script Sharon was welcomed as part of the cast and was pleased to have experienced this with Steve.

The idea of a joint presentation between Leslie Goddard (ALP Member and living history performer since 2003) as Jackie Kennedy and me as Mary Lincoln wasn't actually our idea. We can't remember who came up with it, but it was either Donna Daniels (Lifetime ALP Member) or my husband Robert. So, we can't take the credit for it. However, once the idea was put into our heads, we were excited to create something new.

Since we each have been portraying our respective First Ladies for a number of years, we were already comfortable with those ladies. However, we both started research into the other lady's life, and that proved very interesting. Leslie and I both learned a lot more about the history of First Ladies in general and the White House in particular for this presentation, and we worked hard to include the most accurate information into the script.

This presentation is set in the First Ladies Exhibit at the Smithsonian Institution, more or less at present day. Mrs. Lincoln and Mrs. Kennedy meet, and discuss their experiences. These two ladies have a great deal in common, from their upbringing to their interests, to their involvement in their husband's administrations. They also have some marked differences, some of which the general public might not know or even comprehend.

Leslie and I have received a great deal of interest since we first performed this presentation in February 2015, and we are happy to continue the

performances. So many audiences think they know these ladies from history, and they are surprised to discover there's always more to learn.





Bonnie and Fred Priebe - Bellville, Michigan

Bonnie and Fred were very busy this summer attending over eight different events. Here is a description of two:

On June 28 the Plymouth Historical Museum in Plymouth, Michigan hosted the premier of a special exhibit of First Ladies fashions. Several First Ladies were in attendance, some with their husbands. Included were Martha Washington, Dolly Madison, Mary Lincoln, Eleanor Roosevelt, Jackie Kennedy, Julia Grant and others. Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln mingled with the crowd of over 150 guests, posed for pictures and enjoyed nice treats. The First Lady exhibit runs through September.

On August 6-7 Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln participated in a Civil War event in Port Sanilac, Michigan. There the President and the First Lady spoke on the subject of patriotism, horse trades and slavery, then and now. The audiences were very receptive to our remarks, some bringing friends back Sunday. Mrs. Lincoln also presented a program about Log Cabin Quilts, honoring the 102nd US Colored Troops who mustered in at Historic Fort Wayne in Detroit, for their valiant service during the Civil War. The event also included Civil War fashion show, encampments and a skirmish between Federal and Confederate troops.
